CIBOURE TO **HENDAYE**

he second part of this route will take you on a hike from the village-centre of Ciboure to the French-Spanish border. You can continue your walk into Spain by crossing the Bidassoa. Take the time to enjoy the treasures of the architectural heritage (hospitals, chapels, calvaries), testimony to the age-old hospital culture.

From Place de la Tour d'Auvergne, take the old royal route which goes past the White Cross (cross at St. James Hospital). When you get to the RD810, turn right then after 80m, take Rue de Kafartenea which goes up to the right, continue to the end of the road 3h05 and go up the slope using the stairs **1** 0607195-4803438 which will take you to 0h25 the old SNCF bridge. Turn right onto Chemin d'Agorreta. Carry on until the crossroads and the RD913, cross over and go straight

on for 150m, then turn left onto the Route de Socoa which will take you to the RD810. Turn right and go straight on until the roundabout. Turn right onto Rue Bernard de 3h30 Coral, towards Urrugne village-centre. Go past the church and the town hall. Carry straight on until you get to the RD810. After 100m, cross over with care to take the old route to Spain which goes past the Ospitalia St. house (former **James**

1h40 2 0604685-4801638. Carry on for thirty minutes, and stay on this road (stone track for 500m). At the first crossroads, cross over then, after 150m, turn right onto Chemin de Postaenea. Carry straight on by going up 3h40 6 0598476-4800431. until you get to the RD810, for the last time **3 0602325-4800734.**Cross over and continue

2h25 on the left by walking alongside the RD810. After 150m, on the bend, take the pathway which heads through the heath land, goes past a meadow and comes out onto a dirt track which you take on the left. After 150m, turn right onto Chemin de Migeltxoenborda which goes up, offering a lovely view over Hendaye and Hondarribia. Go down the pathway - which is also on the GR10 itinerary - until you get to the crossroads with the tarmac road 4 0600573-4801121. Turn left and after 150m, turn right onto Chemin d'Agorreta. Continue straight on until you get to the grassy embankment and go straight on onto Rue des Réservoirs up to the roundabout. Turn right onto Rue de Hapetenea then straight onto Rue d'Irandatz and before getting to the next roundabout, cross over the road and take the road opposite onto Rue de Santiago 5 0599230-4800806, which used to overlook the St. James Priorenia hospital. Continue down the road for ten minutes or so. At the second roundabout, take the second exit on the right, Rue de Béhobie, where you'll go straight on for 200m until the end (go under the fly-over). Turn left onto the cul-de-sac until you get to the

old Saint-James bridge, after 150m, which goes over the Bidassoa and marks the end of

SAINT-JAMES HOSPITALS

Along the route between Ciboure and Hendaye there were numerous hospitals set up to welcome Santiago pilgrims (the Red Cross in Ciboure, Agorreta in Urrugne, Priorenia in Hendaye). People crossed Bidassoa river opposite Priorenia. Up until the 15th century, 500,000 "Jacquets" (pilgrims to St. James) travelled to Compostela every year.

In Ciboure, the Way of St. James took the main road, bordered by old Labourdine houses, through the districts "South of the Bordagain hill": the Red Cross, the White Cross and the Place de la Tour d'Auvergne.

This royal (and subsequently imperial) road was downgraded in the mid-19th century, surpassed by today's RD810. Ciboure is home to a pilgrim hospital, of which only the base of the wall surrounding the cross remains today (dating back to 1616). This later became the White Cross, a listed Historical Monument.

Difficult more than 4 hours of walking For experienced walkers. Routes are long and/or challenging (steep ascents, difficult parts).

Walk times: The time taken to complete each route is given as a guide only, taking account of the length of the route, the change in altitude and any difficult aspects.

- Avoid walking alone
- Do not drink water from streams
- · Make sure you are aware of weather conditions

Respecting local activities and inhabitants

- Make sure you close gates
- Avoid walking with a dog. If you do have a dog with you, ensure it is kept on a lead at all times.
- · Starting fires is strictly forbidden
- Ensure you respect private property located near footpaths

Please note!

It is advisable to avoid certain routes during the wood pigeon hunting season (October and November) and the controlled burning season (December to March).
